


today as it was during a career in graphic design, primarily

Derelict Vessel Investigations

Residents often have questions about derelict vessels in the waterways around Punta Gorda. The following information aims to educate citizens about the derelict vessel removal process. First and foremost, all derelict

vessels currently in our City's waterways are accounted for. The Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission (FWC) has already investigated most of them. A link to the derelict vessel interactive map is also provided at the end of this segment. When an officer investigates a derelict vessel, that information must be added to the map. Punta Gorda Police Marine Corporal Russell is experienced in derelict vessel investigations and knows all the boats in the Gilchrist area. All marine officers in our region (FWC, CCSO and PGPD) work collaboratively and communicate regularly whenever a new at-risk or derelict vessel is identified. They conduct joint operations and often assist each other with calls for service.

The Charlotte County Marine Advisory Committee has approved funding for the police department, allowing us to remove a derelict vessel once the investigation is complete. However, these investigations can still take months to finish because of the many legal requirements officers must follow. Once the vessel is found, the owner has 21 days to bring it into compliance. If the boat is brought into compliance and then becomes derelict again, the 21-day period resets. If the owner is not nearby, officers must locate them and send a notice via certified mail. The owner needs time to respond

to this mailing, which adds to the overall length of the investigation.

When FWC conducts an investigation, it must wait for its funding to be released to the contractor, who then schedules the removal. Sometimes, the contractor waits until they have a batch of derelict vessels to remove them all at once, which slows down the process. FWC has carried out many derelict vessel investigations in our area for various reasons, such as storm-related issues, receiving notification first, or our marine officer being unavailable. This has allowed Marine Corporal Russell to focus on removing vessels from the park and Laishley Park. He was solely responsible for securing the owners' cooperation in all those boat removals to help speed up the process. Most of the Punta Gorda derelict vessels that FWC has investigated are now in the pending removal stage. The current stage of each investigation can be viewed on the interactive map, which also displays the officer handling the case, contact phone number and case number.

The police department is also pleased to announce the addition of a second marine officer to the Marine Unit sometime in early September 2025. With the added marine officer, there will be increased patrols and enforcement on Punta Gorda's waterways to keep our boating community safe.



Boater education can be enjoyable and the knowledge that you gain can be applied in many other ways. The weather class I took from our local Power Squadron in Ohio contained information that can be used not only for boating, but for everyday life. After Basic Seamanship and Weather, I had to continue with Piloting and Navigation. Besides the knowledge I gained, the classes were attended by other people with a common interest...safe boating and enjoyment on the water regardless of whether the information learned was applied on an inland lake, the Great Lakes or the ocean.

This month, we highlight Bob and Susan Engelhart's 1952 MGTD Mark II Roadster, Bumble Bee. Bob and Susan have owned this beautiful 1952 MGTD Mark II Roadster since February 1993 and have driven it more than 36,000 miles. Bumble Bee is car number 11953 and has a 1250-cubic-inch 4-cylinder engine, a 4-speed transmission rated at approximately 58 hp with dual 1 ½ inch side draft carburetors, and a 12-volt positive ground electrical system.

Mark II TDs differ from standard MGs with some readily visible differences including larger (1 ½" vs. 1 ¼") carbs (and a whopping 4hp boost) with a bubble on the passenger side of the bonnet (hood) to fit the forward larger carb, dual fuel pumps and additional adjustable shocks on the front. There are many other not-so-visible differences that include larger valves and heavier springs and different rearend ratio. Bob and Susan's car weighs approximately 1,800 lbs.

About 1,710 Mark II Roadsters were built between 1950 and 1953, with 1,593 built for North America with lefthand drive. MG exported about 20,000 standard roadsters to the United States between 1949 and 1953. MGs were a popular choice of returning WW II vets and the TD was designed for the American market with left hand steering and several inches more space in the cockpit for Americans who were generally larger than their British cousins. The TD body style is pre-World War II, beginning in 1932 with the TA and

continuing until 1955 with the MG TF. Bumble Bee's engine and transmission have been rebuilt and was repainted Honey Mellow Yellow and given a new



top, tonneau, interior side panels and carpets in 2015. Bumble Bee also sports a new distributor, solid-state fuel pumps, and rebuilt carbs and generator. Bob and Susan installed a new wiring harness in 2015 which was a labor of love.



Bumble Bee has participated in many tours throughout the Pacific west coast. The longest tour was to the West MG Nationals in 2013 in Carefree, Arizona, and there have been many other adventurous tours to Oregon, Yosemite National Park, Morrow Bay and San Diego. Bumble Bee is a regular driver around Punta Gorda. If you see her on the road, give a wave or toot of your horn.




